Project title:	Social, health and economic implications of obesity for people of Maori and
	Pasifika descent living in Australia, and government initiatives to address the

Project duration:	6 weeks
Description:	Background People of Māori and Pasifika descent living in Australia typically have poor access to health promoting services and experience worse health outcomes than their host counterparts. Little has been written, in the Australian context, on the health inequalities experienced by Maori and Pacific Islander migrants, or on the effectiveness or otherwise of government initiatives to reduce the health inequalities. This review will focus on implications of, and responses to addressing two health issues, and the adequacy of those responses. This literature review is proposed following recent preliminary unpublished reviews on these two health topics for the Maori and Pasifika migrant population. Aim This proposed study aims to increase the current knowledge base by reviewing the available literature for people of Māori and Pasifika descent living in Australia by: a) Reviewing how and in what ways they may experience disadvantage in accessing health promoting services b) Reviewing social, health and economic implications of obesity for this group c) Identifying government initiatives to address the issue of obesity in this group in both Australia and New Zealand d) Assessing how initiatives have, or are likely to, facilitate (or not) Māori and Pasifika access to health promoting services e) Identify the reported (favourable and unfavourable) outcomes of these actions f) To provide recommendations to inform policy makers and health professionals.

Applicant should have previously demonstrated ability to undertake a structured literature database search; work to timelines; produce high quality written work.
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
